Making an impact

Robert E. Field recently retired as chairman of the Manor Group, a company he founded more than 40 years ago in Lancaster Township with his first development, The Manor Houses. The 300-unit apartment complex was among the first here to lease to African-Americans.

Field has been a successful developer and investor in Lancaster and elsewhere for decades. But it is in the area of public service and philanthropy where Field has really made his impact.

Field co-founded Project Forward Leap, a multiyear program aiding promising at-risk inner-city youth. For that work, Field received the Crystal Stair Award from the University of Pennsylvania. Crystal Stair recipients include social justice giants Marion Wright Edelman and Jonathan Kozol. Robert Field is their peer.

Field's work in drug policy reform has been largely anonymous, but his impact has been substantial on the national level.

Field has built libraries and schools in Afghanistan and South America, fed thousands of people, and kept families intact with his work and his money.

Yes, Field criticized the Lancaster County Convention Center project. He raised uncomfortable questions about its financing and use of public funds. Robert Field's cantankerousness is legend. He doesn't gently suffer fools. I can vouch for that after my employ with him. But this is an extraordinary man, one who merits a bow from his community.
