

For adults, we have three special programs this month:

• If you're looking for a job: Tuesday, September 4, at 2 PM - Career Link will be sponsoring a 45 minute Power Point presentation highlighting the services they offer both unemployed and *underemployed* (working but not earning enough to live on) persons. This program also will provide information about the Job Fair being held at Liberty Place on September 12 from 10 to 2



PM.. The Job Fair will feature "Ready to Work" employers. Ready to Work is a program run by Career Link to teach necessary job skills. Upon completion of the program, a candidate will be more likely to be hired by a Ready to Work employer. Participants include: Anvil International, Hollywood Casino, Turkey Hill (both the dairy and minute markets), Lancaster Convention Center, Lancaster General Health, FedEx, and Home Instead Senior Care.

• If you're a history buff: On Thursday, September 6, Mr. Glenn Banner will present a slide show entitled "Burning of the Bridge". Mr. Banner is best known as the author of "Flames Across the Susquehanna" – the narrative of the burning of the mile long bridge connecting Lancaster and York counties. A retired teacher and sports coach, Mr. Banner emphasizes the importance of this little known historical event - which saved the city of Harrisburg and brought about the famous battle of Gettysburg. The program will last 90 minutes and light refreshments will be provided.



 Another program for history buffs is held on Thursday, September 13, at 11 AM. "The Civil War Sesquicentennial at the River Towns" will be presented by Dr. Claire Storm. Next year will be the 150th anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg – and also the 150th anniversary of the burning of the bridge – which was presented in the program by Mr. Banner on September 6th. The Columbia Historical

Preservation Society and Rivertownes are planning many activities to celebrate and remember – this program allows you to catch a sneak peek of what's in store. Again, light refreshments will be provided.
